### Your Health

From the desk of our Parish Nurse

#### Dear Congregation,

#### Eye Health

They say the eyes are the windows to the soul. We don't know if that's true but what we do know is that having perfectly healthy eyes, free from pain or other symptoms are crucial to your health and wellbeing. The good news is that it is easy to learn more about eye problems, symptoms and treatments that will keep you in tip-toe shape.

About 21 million Americans have some type of vision problem. While many of these problems are benign such as nearsightedness other eye conditions like glaucoma, and age related macular degeneration can trigger vision loss or blindness.

The risk of developing eye conditions increase with age. Many people start developing eve diseases in their middle ages. Symptoms may not appear until their eve doctor detects it during a routine screening. But other factors can also up your odds of experiencing vision problems in the future. For example, African Americans and people with a family history of glaucoma may have a higher risk of developing the disease. People with diabetes can develop a condition called diabetic retinopathy, which can damage their retinas. If diagnosed and treated early, it is estimated half of all vision loss and blindness could be prevented.

#### Symptoms of Eye disease

In some cases, the symptoms of certain eye diseases can overlap with others. For example, watery eyes could be a sign of pink eye, allergies or a sty. Resting your eyes might help ease symptoms but in

general if you are experiencing sever or lasting pain, seek your eye doctor for help.

- 1. Blurriness
- 2. Discharge
- 3. Flashes of light
- 4. Irritation
- 5. Light sensitive
- 6. Pain
- 7. Tearing
- 8. Vision loss.

Your vision is not to be taken lightly. With any of the above symptoms continue to occur seek your Eye doctor.

Protecting your eyesight is one of the most important things you can do to help maintain your quality of life. Since the leading causes of blindness and low vision in the United States are age related diseases such as macular degeneration, cataract, diabetic retinopathy, and glaucoma, protecting your eyesight as you age is an essential part of your health care. Here are eight tips for protecting your eyes.

- 1. Find out if you are at risk for eye disease. Be aware of your family history. Is there a family history of diabetes? Are your over the age of 65? Are you African American? All these traits increase the risk of eye disease.
- 2. Have regular physical exams to check for diabetes and high blood pressure. If left untreated these diseases can cause eye problems.
- 3. Look for warning signs of changes in your vision. Some trouble signs are blurred vision, hazy vision, difficulty seeing in low light, red eyes, frequent flashes of light, floaters and pain.

Our ELCA worship music tradition is diverse in many ways (more than can be listed here). Our worship songs are older, newer and from many different cultures and places. Some use more poetic language, while others employ a simpler, more modern style. Some sing of God's omnipotence as the God and ruler of all, others of a tender loving God and Father; of a dear and close friend in Jesus Christ. Some use masculine language, singing of the male aspects of God, while others use feminine language, singing of a God who is also a mothering God. Then there the different types of songs that we sing, such as hymns, chorales, folk tunes, praise choruses, and liturgical settings.

Cultural variety in our worship music helps unite us with believers in many different places and cultures. It also helps unite us with those who have gone before us. When our worship music spans the generations of believers and centuries of worship from many different places and cultures, our worship is greatly enriched. Believers, past and present, have received and do receive the word of God through the cultural lens of their time and place, thus giving them unique perspectives about God, which found their way into the hymns of the time. By singing these songs we are united with these believers and their valuable perspectives and insights into God and God's word, broadening our own understanding of our faith.

An example of the above would be the numerous African American spirituals that enrich our worship music tradition. Many


- 4. Exercise more frequently. Some studies show walking regularly can reduce your risks.
