#### From Pastor Harald Bringsjord

In Mark Twain's book Huckleberry Finn. Huck is one of those characters who seems to go against the grain of society, not intentionally, but because he wants to be free. He runs away from home and his drunken father. He flees the efforts to be civilized. He is continually on the move as he floats down the river. He is seeking freedom. But Huck in this process has to take time to evaluate why he believes what he believes, and why he does what he does. A crisis develops when Huck has to decide whether to turn Jim, a runaway slave, in to his owner. Huck's conscience troubles him. He has been trained to think that the right thing to do would be to tell where Jim is hiding so that he could be returned to his lawful owner. His parents, his teachers, his government, even his pastor and Sunday school teachers would have insisted that he tell on Jim. Surely God would want Huck to do that, and if he didn't, he would be punished and go to hell. After all, Jim was a black man, and he was someone's property. No wonder Huck couldn't pray. His obligation was as plain as day. "You can't pray a lie," Huck says: "So I was full of trouble, full as I could be; and didn't know what to do. At last I had an idea; and I says, I'll go and write the letter - and then see if I can pray. Why, it was astonishing, the way I felt as light as a feather right straight off, and my troubles all gone. So I got a piece of paper and a pencil, all glad and excited, and set down and wrote: 'Miss Watson, your runaway slave Jim is down here two mile below

Pikesville, and Mr. Phelps has got him and he will give him up for the reward if you send.' Huck Finn

I felt good and all washed clean of sin for the first time I had ever felt so in my life, and I knowed I could pray now. But I didn't do it straight off, but laid the paper down and set there thinking thinking how good it was all this happened so, and how near I come to being lost and going to hell. And went on thinking. And go to thinking over our trip down the river; and I see Jim before me all the time: in the day and in the nighttime, sometimes moonlight, sometimes storms, and we a floating along, talking and singing and laughing. But somehow I couldn't seem to strike no places to harden me against him, but only the other kind. I'd see him standing my watch on top of his'n, 'stead of calling me, so I could go on sleeping..., how good he always was; and at last I struck the time I saved him by telling the men we had smallpox aboard, and he was so grateful, and said I was the best friend old Jim ever had in the world, and the only one he's got now; and then I happened to look around and see that paper. It was a close place. I took it up, and held it in my hand. I was a trembling, because I'd got to decide forever, betwixt two things, and I knowed it. I studied a minute, sort of holding my breath, and then says to myself: "All right, then, I'll go to hell" and tore it up. This excerpt is from "Called To Freedom pages 84-85. This

#### **Special Congregational Meeting**

Good Shepherd Congregation Council, at it's April 16th meeting reviewed and approved the Finance and Executive Committee's recommendation that were also discussed at the Coordinator of Youth and Family Ministry discussion on March 17th:


- A. To call a special meeting of the congregation for the sole purpose of approving compensation for the Coordinator of Youth and Family Ministry position. A majority vote, by written ballot, is required by the attendee at the Special Congregation Meeting to approve the recommended compensation. No other business will be conducted at the meeting. Proxy votes are not allowed.
- B. For the congregation's approval, for compensation of \$13-15 per hour based on the candidate(s) education and/or experience for up to 20 hours per week coordinating the Youth and Family Ministry program.

Sunday, May 5th between services, approximately 9:45am in the Sanctuary. Vote by written ballot to be collected and calculated immediately by the Executive Committee or at least three officers of the church.

The following is a recommendation by the Finance Committee, approved by the Church Council: This first year will be funding out of reserves. The funds for the following years will through the annual stewardship campaign. We actively state that we are a church with the youth; we would like to encourage this by gathering funding for this position. As part of the stewardship drive, we will ask for matching funds from individuals within this church or potentially other designated funds.

# Your Health From the desk of our Parish Nurse

Dear Congregation,

May is Stroke awareness month. Each year nearly 800,000 people experience a new or recurrent stroke. A stroke is a brain attack. It can happen to anyone at any time. It occurs when blood flow to an area of the brain is cut off. When this happens, the brain cells are deprived of oxygen and begin to die. When brain cells die during a stroke, abilities controlled by that area of the brain such as memory and muscle control are lost. How a person is affected by their stroke depends on where the stroke occurs in the brain and how much the brain is damaged. For example, someone who had a small stroke may only have minor problems such as temporary weakness of an arm or leg. People who have larger strokes may be permanently paralyzed on one side of their body or lose their ability to speak. Some people recover completely from strokes, but more than 2/3 of survivors will have some type of disability.

There are two types of strokes Hemorrhagic and Ischemic. Hemorrhagic is a brain aneurysm burst or a weakened blood vessel leak. While this is the least common of the two types of strokes, it most often results in death. Ischemic strokes happen when a blood vessel to the brain is blocked by a blood clot. These strokes receive medical treatment with medications or interventional procedures to remove or break down the blockage.

Certain individuals are more at risk for stroke than others. High blood pressure, diabetes, obesity or excessive drug use significantly increase a person's risk of stroke. Individuals who have had a stroke in the past are also at a greater risk for a repeat incident. The following signs and symptoms are good indicators that a person may be having a stroke. If you find yourself in a situation where you suspect you or another person is having a stroke, these instructions can help you remain calm and

know what to do. Seven Steps to Recognize and respond to a Stroke

> Recognize the warning signs. Identify the symptoms Call emergency services Do not eat or drink Try to remain calm Collect details for the first responders. Seek a companion to help.

The acronym **B.E. F.A.S.T** will help you remember signs and symptoms of stroke. **B** stands for a sudden loss of balance. **E** stands for a victim experiencing double vision or unable to see out of one eve. F stands for facial droop. Ask the victim to smile.

A stands for when you ask a person to raise their arms a stroke victim will only be able to control one side. One side will drift down. S stands for slurred confused speech. Have the victim repeat a phrase like "You can't teach an old dog new tricks". It will be slurred or unable to repeat.

T stands for time. The sooner 911 is called the better chance for a better recovery. As difficult as it may be during an emergency situation, staying calm can save a life, keeping a clear head will allow you to better asses the victim and keep them safe. Your calmness will be reassuring. Most strokes are caused by high blood pressure, a calm attitude can keep the person's blood pressure from spiking further. 80% of strokes are preventable and the sooner treatment after diagnosis begins the better outcome for the victim. Stroke is the leading cause of adult disability in the U.S. A stroke can happen at any age, any time, be prepared and know the signs.

#### Confirmation

When I tell people I teach confirmation, I often get some surprised reactions. I've heard everything from, "that takes someone special" to "I bet that's difficult." Both are true! I'm sure there is not a confirmation student who would not tell you there are days I've been frustrated with them – mostly for talking through prayer requests. You can ask anyone of them and hopefully they can tell that is my biggest pet peeve:) However, each spring when I get to read their faith statements and stand up with them as they profess their faith, those nights of frustration are forgotten.

Each year I ask students to do something very hard, something that many of us adults would struggle to do. I ask them to write down what their faith means to them. I am one of the few individuals who gets to read these and in doing so, I get glimpse inside them that I am forever grateful for. It is a glimpse that lets me know we as a congregation are doing something right as we bring our children up in faith. It is glimpse that lets me know their are teenagers out there that have a support group to help them grow in their faith. It is a glimpse that tells me the next generation loves our Lord and each other and reminds me there are good people in this world.

As I always do each spring, I will share portions of students faith statements so you can also have a glimpse of this faith. I hope you will experience the joy and hope that I experience when I read this words!

"One things I love about this church is how connected we are. If you are struggling and need help, there are people all around you who are willing [to help]. I want to continue with this atmosphere of openness and caring and bring it into my life. Hopefully in my existence I can be thought of by those around me as a kind and helpful person."

"When I play sports, I know that Christ is with me and he will help and keep me safe from injuries. Even if I happen to get injured, I know that Christ will help me in the healing process. God gave me the gift of athleticism and the abilities to do everything that I can."

"This verse [Philippians 4: 6-7] is a good reminder for me since I can be anxious sometimes and I need to remember to pray and ask that everything is going to work out. It also reminds me that it is okay that I don't understand God's love because it too much for any human to completely understand. I just need to remember that Jesus is strong and mighty and that I don't need to be. I just need to believe and trust in God."

"There hasn't been on specific moment where I felt God with me more than the other. Now that I am attending church and now that I am older, I feel as if my faith is strong then before. I think as you get older, you understand and learn what faith means to you. Because of this, I try very hard to spread God's word by being kind and doing good things for other people."

"A special place [for me] is probably either my house or my church because those are both places I can go to decompress and breath. Those are places I can go to think about my day and how it went or if I've done something that wasn't a smart choice."

# Music Notes From the Director of Music

#### "Jesu, Jesu, Fill Us with Your Love"

The text for "Jesu, Jesu, Fill Us with Your Love" was written by Thomas Stevenson Colvin (1925-2000), a long time missionary to Africa. Colvin was born and educated in Glasgow, but spent most of his working life serving as a Church of Scotland missionary; first in Malawi and then in Tamale, Northern Ghana. He and his wife, Patricia, later returned to Malawi, staying there until he retired in 1990.

Colvin wrote the hymn "Jesu, Jesu, Fill Us with Your Love" in 1963, while attending a lay-training course on agriculture, development and evangelism in Chereponi, Northern Ghana. New converts to the faith brought him a folk tune which they felt would be appropriate for a song about Christian love. Colvin shared these thoughts about his writing of the text: "Sitting there in the moonlight, I felt it simply had to be about black and white, rich and poor. I was ashamed of the wasteful affluence of my people but proud of the Gospel that transforms us into servants of one another. It is only when we who are rich learn to have the humility of the slave toward the poor of the world that we shall be able to learn from them; they have so much to teach us and share with us."

The tune for this hymn, named Chereponi by Colvin after the village where he first heard it, was originally from a Ghanaian love song. Colvin believed all Christians should worship in their native language and encouraged the African Christians, among whom he lived and served, to sing their praise to God with their own musical traditions.

The hymn as based on John 13, where Jesus washes the feet of the disciples. This Gospel text came to have special meaning for Colvin as he witnessed the people of Ghana living out the example of Jesus; doing for one another what Christ has done for them.



is a description of an old type of piety breaking down and a new liberation rising up. According to the old piety, sin would be defined as prohibitions: do not drink, do not play cards, do not smoke, do not tell lies, with the main one being: do not conceal a fugitive slave. What Huck's reflection on his life brings him to, is a reflection on prayer and faith in God on the one hand and a concern for the freedom of another human being on the other hand. What Huck discovers is that he cannot be free unless Jim is also free. The freedom he wills for himself he must also will for others. Jesus states this similarly with the command: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, and mind, and your neighbor as yourself." The key is to see yourself in your neighbor. We cannot have shalom (wholeness) until our neighbor also has shalom. Easter (which the church continues to celebrate for 29 of the 50 days of Easter in May this year) is a time when we celebrate the freedom Christ gives us from sin, death, and the power of the devil. We, however, are set free not to be oppressors, not to try to rule over others, but we are set free so that we can see the face of a brother and a sister even though their skin color may be different, even though their habits may be different, even though their culture, their political system, their country, their family life, their life style, their age, their economic status may be different. We are set free to see in all people, even an enemy, a brother or a sister. That is what Huck saw in Jim. That is what Christ sees in us. That is what we are called to see in others, even our enemies. Rejoice in your calling, for Christ is risen and has set us free.
