From Pastor Harald Bringsjord

In John 17, Jesus prays for his disciples, saying to God, "The glory that you have given me I have given them, so that they may be one, as we are one. I in them and you in me, that they may become completely one."

When author and poet Kathleen Norris moved from New York City to her family's homestead in Lemmon, South Dakota, she found herself drawn to the Church and thinking, for the first time in a very long while, about the Christian faith. She joined a church in Lemmon and writes about her experience in her books "Dakota" and "Cloister Walk." In her book "Amazing Grace" she reflects on the Church and its unity when she writes:

"From the outside, church congregations can look like remarkably contentious places, full of hypocrites who talk about love while fighting each other tooth and nail. This is the reason many people give for avoiding them. On the inside, however, it is a different matter, a matter of struggling to maintain unity as the body of Christ given the fact that we have precious little uniformity. I have only to look at the congregation I know best, the one I belong to. We are not individuals who have come together because we are like-minded. That is not a church but a political party. We are like most healthy churches, I think, in that we can do pretty well when it comes to loving and serving God, each other, and the world: but God help us if we have to agree about things. I could test our uniformity by suggesting a major remodeling of the sanctuary, or worse, the Holy of holies-the church kitchen. But I value my life too

much." She continues: "The church is like the incarnation itself, a shaky proposition. It is a human institution, full of ordinary people, sinners like me, who do and say cruel things. But it is also a divinely inspired institution, full of good purpose, which partakes of a unity far greater than the sum of its parts. That is why it is called the Body of Christ." (pp. 272-3).

One of the things that has been inspiring to me here at Good Shepherd is the care and the striving to help one another and the community in diverse ways.

Have we been open as a congregation? Of course, we have been open. Ministry is taking place because ministry is done outside of the building as we care for one another. But ministry can also be done in the building as we gather in person to be reminded that we are in this ministry work together. To see one another is a big deal.

I'm delighted to be able to remind everyone who is reading this article that we are again gathering in the building. Worship through the summer will be at 9am in the building except on July 18th, when worship will be in the parking lot for our last scheduled parking lot worship service.

The quilters have begun to gather again in the building and at the last church council meeting on June 15th, the council gathered in the building. The men's group has begun to gather on the lawn behind the church, the Building and Grounds have met at times in the garage. The committee in charge of

Dear Members of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church,

On behalf of the Church Council, the Re-Opening Committee has an update for the plan for opening Good Shepherd Lutheran Church. With safety and your cooperation foremost in reinstating services and activities in the church, please read and understand your role in the process.

This is an update to the interim plan for this church building and property. This committee remains vigilant in keeping staff and members of the church safe. In the process of re-opening, a variety of service options are available, allowing for personal choices for attending. Masks, even if attendee is vaccinated, are required to be worn properly during in building worship services. Leaders of the service may lower or remove mask during speaking or singing. The organist, based on distancing may remove mask while seated and playing.

Sunday Drive-In Church- 9am (July 18) Outdoor, weather permitting Sunday Worship- 9am June 20 - Sept 5th Sept 12th resume 8:30am and 10:30am services

Indoor seating is every other pew and social distancing is still encouraged and masks are required. Persons of the same household may be seated together.

Keeping our commitment to grow ministry, the indoor 9am Sunday service of Good Shepherd can be viewed on your computer or electronic device online at gslacrosse.org. Archived church services of Good Shepherd can also be found on the church's website!

Groups and Committees may meet in the building, but meeting outside or through Zoom is the safest. The Mattes Center will be used for all meetings held indoors. If a group or committee wants to meet in person, contact the Church Office. The Chairperson or Leader of the Group or Committee will need to provide the date/time of the meeting to the Church Office to allow adequate time for set-up and sanitizing.

Large community groups who use the church for meeting space will need to contact the Church Office and adhere to the Interim Plan. This committee will meet again August 9, 2021 to review the current COVID conditions, the Interim Plans, and church use to further update its recommendations.

The success of the re-opening plan is dependent on the cooperation of all when coming together to hear the word of God and celebrate our faith. We have a church that has remained strong through a pandemic because of each of you. Thank you.



Please continue to support the Hintgen Food Project with your donations. As the pandemic drags on many families continue to struggle to make ends meet.







July is healthy vision month. If your eyes feel healthy, it's easy to assume they are healthy. But many eye diseases don't have any warning signs- so you could have an eye problem and not know it. The good news is there's a lot you can do to set yourself up for a lifetime of seeing well.

Having a regular dilated eye exam to check for common eye problems is one way to assure your vision stays in tip top shape. Some eye conditions can cause vision loss and even blindness and include cataracts or clouding of the eye, retinopathy which causes damage to the blood vessels in the back of the eye, glaucoma or damage to the optic nerve resulting in increased eye pressure, and age-related macular degeneration which affects central vision.

The following can all help protect your vision. Eat right: in particular, eat plenty of dark leafy greens such as spinach, kale, or collard greens, and fish that is high in omega-3 fatty acids. Maintain a healthy

Music Notes From The Director of Music


Hymn Focus: "What a Friend We Have in Jesus"

Joseph Medlicott Scriven (1819-1886) was born in Bainbridge, County Down, Ireland to John Scriven, a captain in the Royal Marines and Jane Medlicott Scriven. He graduated with a B.A. Degree from Trinity College in Dublin, embracing the teachings of the Plymouth Brethren. He quickly established himself as a teacher and was going to marry his childhood sweetheart in 1843, but the day before their wedding she died in a tragic drowning accident. Grief stricken, he left Ireland in 1845 and began a new life in Canada, settling in Woodstock, Ontario, where he made a living teaching.

In 1855 Scriven received word from Ireland that his mother was gravely ill. Lacking enough money to travel back to Ireland, he composed a poem to comfort her called "Pray Without Ceasing". He later shared the poem with a friend, who took it to a music publisher. It was renamed and set to music by American attorney and composer Charles Converse and published in 1868 with the title "What a Friend We Have in Jesus".

Moving to Port Hope, Ontario in 1857, Scriven met Eliza Catherine Roche and the two fell in love, planning to marry in 1860. Again, however, tragedy struck and shortly before their wedding Eliza contracted pneumonia and died 4 months later at the age of 23.

Although published in 1868, the writer of the lyrics to this hymn was not known until nearly 30 years later, when a friend visited Scriven and discovered the poem in his papers. When asked about it, Scriven replied, "The Lord and I together wrote the song".

Malpica was elected on the fifth ballot, with 108 votes: with The Rev. Rebecca Piper, co-pastor of Calvary Lutheran Church in Rapid City, SD, receiving 81 votes. Rev. Malpica has served as pastor of Faith Lutheran Church in Janesville since 2017. Prior to that, he served as associate pastor of Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church in Austin, TX, from 2014 to 2017. He earned his BA from Luther College in Decorah, IA, in 2009 and his Master of Divinity degree from Luther Seminary in St. Paul, MN. in 2013. His installation will take place on Sept. 26th.
