#### From Pastor Harald Bringsjord

A peaceful solution must be found."

Our social statement For Peace in God's World offers guidance: We of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America share with the Church of Jesus Christ in all times and places the calling to be peacemakers... The basis of the Church's peace-calling is in God's final







# From our Re-opening Committee

#### Reflects changes from our committee meeting on March 14

On behalf of the Church Council, the Re-Opening Committee has an update for Good Shepherd Lutheran Church and reinstating activities of the church, please read to understand your role in the process. This is an update to the interim plan for this church building and property as of March 15, 2022. The Church Council has approved the following measures of reinstating a variety of former practices that were suspended due to COVID.

- Masks are optional in the church building.
- The Welcome Area is open along with the kitchenette coat rack, and coffee station.
- Pews will remain as every other available for seating.
- Social distancing, or sitting with members of your household is still encouraged.
- Continue to use hand sanitizer throughout the church building.
- The Adult, Gloria Dei and Bell Choirs to resume practicing and performing.
- Sunday School is available for children attending Good Shepherd on Sundays.
- The Nursery is available for families. Please wipe down anything used or that may have gone into a little one's mouth.
- Food, beverages, pot lucks, meals, events are able to be planned again. Please communicate use of the kitchen with the Church Office.

Keeping our commitment to grow ministry, the Sunday service of Good Shepherd will remain at 8:30 and 10:30am until the switch to summer hours on June 5<sup>th</sup>-then the service times are 8:30 and 10am. The 8:30am service can be viewed on your computer or electronic device online at <u>gslacrosse.org</u>. Archived services can also be found on that website.

Community Groups, Church Groups and Committees may meet and a laptop computer is available for members who wish to participate through Zoom. Please communicate your meeting date and time with the Church Office.

Members are asked to report a positive COVID test result for anyone who attended Good Shepherd Worship Services, Sunday School or Confirmation, or Committee or Group meeting within 48 hours after the onset of symptoms.

This committee has changed its name to the **Communal Health Committee** as a result of the Church moving back to Phase 1 of its COVID Plan and has reinstated its former practices. This committee will continue to monitor for any significant changes in our community health and advise the church accordingly. This Committee will meet again May 16, 2022.

THANK YOU for your prayers, patience, and cooperation as we came together to hear the word of God and celebrate our faith. We have a church that has remained strong through a pandemic because of each of you. Thanks be to God.

Thank you to Ann Hudson who sends out meaningful cards and handmade prayer shawls to bereaved families throughout the year.




#### High School Youth Group (Grades 9-12)

April is national Parkinson's awareness month, and we decided to focus our article on such. According to the Mayo Clinic, Parkinson's is a progressive nervous system disorder that affects movement. Often, symptoms start gradually and usually accompany a tremor that may be barely noticeable. In the early stages of Parkinson's, your face may show little or no expression. Although Parkinson's can't be cured, medications are aimed to significantly improve your symptoms. Occasionally, your doctor may suggest surgery to regulate certain regions of your brain and improve symptoms.

In Parkinson disease, nerve cells in the brain gradually break down. Many of the symptoms one may experience are due to a loss of neurons that produce messengers in your brain called dopamine. When dopamine levels decrease, it results in abnormal brain activity. The exact cause of Parkinson's disease is unknown but geneses, environmental trippers such as toxins may increase your risk of Parkinson's. An age of 60 or greater, being a male, and having a close relative with Parkinson's all increase your risk factors.

Signs and symptoms of Parkinson's can be difference for everyone. Symptoms often begin on one side of the body and usually remain worse on that side. Symptoms may include tremor, slowed movement, rigid muscles, impaired posture and balance, loss of automatic movements such as blinking or smiling, slurred or hesitated speech, and writing changes.

Medications such as carbidopa-levodopa, and dopamine agonists may be prescribed by your doctor. A surgical procedure in which a deep brain stimulator is implanted and can help those who have unstable medication responses. Deep brain stimulators can help reduce or halt involuntary movements, reduce tremors and improve slowing of movement.

#### **Music Notes** From The Director of Music

#### Hymn Spotlight: "Jesu, Jesu, Fill Us with Your Love"

The text for "Jesu, Jesu, Fill Us with Your Love" was written by Thomas Stevenson Colvin (1925-2000), a long time missionary to Africa. Colvin was born and educated in Glasgow, but spent most of his working life serving as a Church of Scotland missionary; first in Malawi and then in Tamale, Northern Ghana. He and his wife, Patricia, later returned to Malawi, staying there until he retired in 1990.

Colvin wrote the hymn "Jesu, Jesu, Fill Us with Your Love" in 1963, while attending a lay-training course on agriculture, development and evangelism in Chereponi, Northern Ghana. New converts to the faith brought him a folk tune which they felt would be appropriate for a song about Christian love. Colvin shared these thoughts about his writing of the text:

"Sitting there in the moonlight, I felt it simply had to be about black and white, rich and poor. I was ashamed of the wasteful affluence of my people but proud of the Gospel that transforms us into servants of one another. It is only when we who are rich learn to have the humility of the slave toward the poor of the world that we shall be able to learn from them; they have so much to teach us and share with us."


The tune for this hymn, named Chereponi by Colvin after the village where he first heard it, was originally from a Ghanaian love song. Colvin believed all Christians should worship in their native language and

The hymn as based on John 13, where Jesus washes the feet of the disciples. This Gospel text came to have special meaning for Colvin as he witnessed the people of Ghana living out the example of Jesus: doing for one another what Christ has done for them.

#### Dear Friends,

For the past several years, Viterbo University through the D.B. Reinhart Institute for Leadership in Ethics directed by Dr. Rick Kyte has been bringing Holocaust survivors to our area. Far too soon the world will be left to rely on memoirs and videos to learn the lessons of the Holocaust. On Thursday March 31st at 7:00 p.m. we will bring another Holocaust survivor to the Viterbo Fine Arts Center to speak to our community free-of-charge.

Holocaust survivor Peter Feigl, who graced our stage in 2012, will return in conjunction with the 15th annual Holocaust Educators' Workshop at Viterbo for several states-wide Holocaust educators on March 31st-April 1st. Peter's parents had him baptized as a Catholic in 1939 to protect him from Nazi persecution of Jews. The Feigls fled several countries to escape continued discrimination and oppression, but Peter's parents were arrested and murdered at Auschwitz in 1942. Helped by Quakers and others, Peter was hidden in various places including the French village of Le Chambon which helped save 3,500 Jews, mainly children. Provided with false identity papers, Peter was finally helped across the border into Switzerland in May 1944 and emigrated to the U.S. in July 1946.

Peter is the only living diarist of the 14 featured in the book Salvaged Pages: Young Writers' Diaries of the Holocaust edited by Alexandra Zapruder. Alexandra sifted through 62 diaries left by teens during the Holocaust before choosing her final 14. A bonus will be having Alexandra with us to discuss her book that night before Peter presents. Salvaged Pages will be on sale at Viterbo the evening of Peter's presentation, and he will do a book signing. Peter is dynamic and his story will amaze you.

I look forward to seeing you. Please invite friends to join you and do come early to get a seat. I used to advise people to come by 6:30 p.m. to insure getting a seat, but when we had our last survivor at Viterbo, some people who arrived at 6:30 p.m. were turned away because we were full. Masks are recommended but not required.

Feel free to e-mail me at clottdarryle@gmail.com or call me at 612-720-6447 with questions. The age of survivors is drawing to a close. To meet Holocaust survivors in person is to touch history. No two stories are exactly alike, but the sense of the story-the impact of terror, deprivation and personal loss-touches the listener. It is difficult to describe the feeling of awe a person experiences when hearing history from one who lived it. Please do not miss this opportunity.
